He has been active in a number of things through the years so I have known him for quite a while. His grade has a hundred students in it, our largest in some time, and I can count on the fingers of one hand how many kids regularly stopped to improve their learning, Erik is one of those kids.

The next year Erik signed up for AP United States History and I saw someone who had grown a great deal from the past year but still had all of the work ethic and curiosity that made him such a great student. What I learned to value in Erik last year was the way that he was willing to take risks and think out loud about historical questions, a trait that students often don't have because they are afraid of getting the answer wrong. Erik hates being wrong too but he recognizes that sometimes you have to wonder and even speculate if you are going to begin to answer a question and he has learned to do that in a reasonable and effective way.

Beyond that, I am sure that you have reviewed Erik's transcript and see that his grades are very strong and that he is very involved in activities at school. I want to be sure to tell you that Erik actually does all of those things. As I mentioned earlier Riverview is a small place and we need our kids to be involved in many different things or we cannot field a sport or club. Erik has embraced that role. I have spent many an hour talking with him about track and cross country, his role on the team, and his hopes for both the team and himself. He has a passion for success and achieving the goals that have been set,

however, at the same time he has an essential decency. For Erik, winning is important but it is more important to win in the right way and to have everyone share in the experience.
